



CAMP MUJUK COMMANDING OFFICER'S POLICY ON SUBSTANCE ABUSE



There is no place for any form of alcohol abuse or use of illegal drugs in our Corps. Alcohol and drug abuse destroys our Marine Corps family, undermines our core values, and can cause useless loss of life. Marines and Sailors of Camp Mujuk are disciplined professionals singularly focused on mission accomplishment. Involvement with any form of illegal drug activity or irresponsible consumption of alcohol prevents the required level of commitment necessary of our profession. This type of undisciplined and unprofessional behavior is unacceptable and will not be tolerated. The Marine Corps program for Substance Abuse is governed by MCO 5300.17. Key elements of the Marine Corps Substance Abuse program include prevention, timely identification, education, treatment, or administrative actions followed by either restoration to full duty or separation, as appropriate.

The use of illegal or unauthorized prescription drugs – or any substance designed or taken to provide a “high” – breaks faith with our core values of Honor, Courage, and Commitment. I will ruthlessly enforce the Marine Corps standard of ZERO tolerance. Anyone found guilty of using, possessing, or selling illegal drugs or other mind-altering substances (such as “spice”) or illegally using, misusing, or selling prescription drugs will be punished in accordance with the UCMJ and immediately processed for administrative separation.

Drink responsibly – Alcohol consumption is permissible...when done so within the framework of the law and when done so responsibly. Drink in moderation and stay in control of your actions. Bad things happen when people drink too much. Make a plan and stick with that plan. There are many options available: appoint a designated driver, plan to take a cab, or call me. No Marine or Sailor within this command has a reason for drinking and driving. All Marines and Sailors of Camp Mujuk, regardless of physical location and duty status, are required to abide by the rules, regulations, and standards discussed herein.

Every Member of this unit also has an obligation to conform and educate others on this policy and my expectations. Moreover, report known or suspected violations of this policy to the chain of command or via the “anymouse” program. If you have questions, contact the Camp Mujuk Substance Abuse Control Officer - or come by and see me – I am always available.
